Christians are called to have an attitude of thankfulness. This gratitude is shown in our giving thanks to God for the abundant grace shown to us. It is God who is the object of our thanksgiving.

In many of Paul's letters he begins the letter with thanksgiving to God for the people to whom he is writing. Note that he does not thank them. He thanks God for them:

"I thank God every time I remember you. . . . " (Philippians 1:3)

"We always give thanks to God for all of you and mention you in our prayers. . . . " (I Thessalonians 1:2)

"We must always give thanks to God for you, brothers and sisters, as is right. . . ." (II Thessalonians 1:3)

When we were children, we were taught to say "thank you" when someone gave us something. An adult would prompt us with, "Now, what do you say?"

Saying "thank you" is a mark of good upbringing and having manners. But our thankfulness to God is more than manners and politeness. Our thanks to God shows that God is the source of all of our blessings. The faithfulness of Paul's congregations in Philippi and Thessalonica was not an achievement of the people themselves, but the Spirit of God at work and alive in them.

In November we begin and end the month focused upon thanksgiving. November 1<sup>st</sup> is All Saints' Day. Then, the fourth Thursday in November is Thanksgiving Day, our national day to give thanks to God for all of God's blessings.

All Saints' Sunday is a time we remember those who have died in the Lord. We have begun a practice of bringing a photo of a friend or loved one who now is a part of the Communion of Saints to place on the 'Day of the Dead' table. Those who have died, though gone from our sight, are still seen in the mind of God. We give thanks to God

that "death has lost its sting" and death does not have the last word over our lives.

On November 26<sup>th</sup>, Thanksgiving Day, as a nation we are called to give thanks to God by a Presidential Proclamation. It is a day for us as a nation to give credit where credit is due. It is a day for us as a nation to show humility and reverence to the One whose blessings and providence have kept us and maintained us. The prophets of Israel called the people to task to show, in all of their activity, the justice and mercy and love that God had shown to them.

In November, from the beginning to the end, let us all rejoice in the blessings given to us. How wonderful it would be if we could see this as a model for all the months of the year!


### PLEDGING OUR STEWARDSHIP FOR THE FUTURE



#### **ADULT EDUCATION IN NOVEMBER**

**November 8 and November 15** – Come prepared to learn and discuss *Bullving*. Did you know it's against the law in Oregon?

Dr. Debra Harris, Assistant Professor at the University of Wisconsin – Oshkosh will present a two part series about Bullying. Dr. Harris holds a Ph.D. in School and Community Health from the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque.

Bullying is defined as the repeated health-harming mistreatment of one or more persons (the targets) by one or more perpetrators that takes one or more of the following forms:

- Verbal abuse
- Offending conduct/behaviors (including nonverbal) which are threatening, humiliating or intimidating
- Work interference sabotage which prevents work from being done.

Bullying is about what all bullies want: control. Despite the mask of bravado, they are tiny, insecure people. Bullying does not stop at the school vard gate. Adult targets are often recognized in their fields, respected by colleagues, well-liked and personable. In the workplace, keeping quiet about bullying is part of the problem; the target is usually embarrassed and feels he or she should be able to handle the situation. According to Dr. Harris, "we need to get the word out that bullying behavior is unacceptable."


