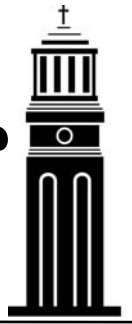

One member of this congregation had a question for me last week. “Why do we even keep coming to church?”

Why do we indeed. I, of course, have some ideas about that and being who I am and the grounding of my theological background, let me think about the answers in my “methodical” way.

Scripture tells us to come. “Wherever two or three are gathered, there I am.” (Matt. 18:20) Crowds followed Jesus; the apostles met in groups.

Tradition tells us to come. Christians have been meeting in small or large groups from the very beginning. They needed each other. Small hidden groups evolved into buildings dedicated to study and worship. Our reformed tradition calls for a life lived in community as a challenge and a comfort. When we baptize a baby or a child, we agree to live our lives as models of lives that reflect the gospel, so that the child will be brought up to give reverent attendance to “the private and public worship of God.” (Westminster Confession of Faith, XXIII.8)

Reason tells us to come. Common sense and public witness tells us that we can do more together than we can ever do on our own. And oh, how we want to make a difference.

Experience tells us to come. But as adults we can choose not to attend worship based on many criteria. It is our only day off, we need to sleep, we have company, or we believe we can do it on our own. I’m the first to admit that there are some Sunday mornings when I’d just as soon stay home. But I believe that continued absence from worship affects our faith.

It is all about contact. That weekly reminder that God loves us, and not only us, but all those in the pews around us is a powerful testament to the total wonder and mystery of what it means to be part of something. We need each other. We need to hear words that tell the truth. We need the warmth of a handshake or hug or smile. We need the challenge of believing that the world could be and will be different. On days that our spirits feel dimmed by circumstances, the church in community can remind us in tangible ways that joy lives among us.

As Bobbi Tucker said one Sunday not long ago, echoing many of you, “You don’t know what you miss – until you miss.”



So come, bring your children and your parents and your friends. There is love here. There is comfort. There is challenge. There is love. Don’t miss out!

THANKSGIVING EVE WORSHIP

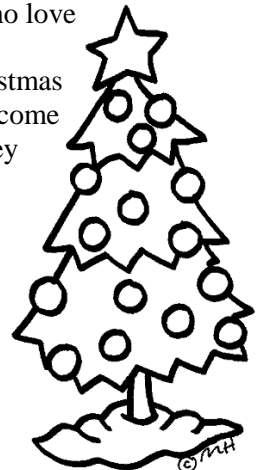
Gather for Thanksgiving Eve Worship on Wednesday, November 23rd at 7:30 p.m., hosted by Augustana Lutheran Church: 2710 Northeast 14th Avenue. The Rev. David Dornack will preach the sermon. This ecumenical worship service includes representatives from several area congregations: Augustana Lutheran, Rose City Park United Methodist, Our Lady of Lavang Catholic, Rose City Park Presbyterian, and St. Michael and All Angels Episcopal.

CHRISTMAS WORSHIP

Early Eve Worship at 5 p.m. is a traditional Christmas Eve candlelight worship service for young and old, perfect for those who retire early.

Candlelight Communion Worship at 9 p.m. is a beautiful way to usher in the birth of Christ. The Chancel Choir will sing. Fellowship time follows this service with wassail and Christmas cookies in the parlor. Both services will be held in the sanctuary. Doors will open 30 minutes before each service. MORE THAN ENOUGH – A NEW VIEW OF STEWARDSHIP

Paul, in his second letter to the Corinthians, advises: “*God can bless you with everything you need, and you will always have more than enough to do all kinds of good things for others.*” Paul advises the Corinthians – and us – to be generous not because we have to, but because God has provided abundantly for us, and will always give us what we need. Our giving is a matter of trusting Him, and enriching our relationships with the receivers of our gifts and with God.

Paul didn’t simply ask the Corinthians to give, but to become active partners with God in increasing abundance. When, as in the parable of the talents, we draw on our talents, skills and imagination, we help create more than enough to share with the church and others.

As an expression of this, our 2011 Stewardship Campaign will be very unique – unlike anything Rose City Park has ever done before. Our theme of *More Than Enough* will challenge us not simply to give, but to become active stewards by investing our gifts and talents to experience God providing more than enough for our needs and the needs of our vibrant community of faith.

On Sunday, November 6th, instead of simply asking you to pledge your gift for next year, you will have the opportunity to voluntarily accept a gift from the church – let’s call it a “*mustard seed*” – of \$50, \$100 or more, whatever you choose. Your challenge is to invest these funds and grow them by providing a service, activity, or product in our wider community. You might hold a tag sale, knit or quilt items for a holiday bazaar, hold a dog wash, a bake sale or any other activity drawing on your talents and creativity. You can even band together as friends, Mariners, committees or Tables for Eight groups, to do a group project. Then, we’ll return these gifts and the proceeds of our efforts with our 2012 Stewardship pledges in January, growing our giving beyond what we give of our own resources.

We hope you will accept the invitation and begin thinking creatively about the Stewardship activity you will undertake – whether individually, as a family or as a group – to help us create *More Than Enough*.

CHRISTMAS JOY OFFERING

A cherished Presbyterian tradition since the 1930s, the Christmas Joy Offering is one of the four special offerings designated by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Because Advent and Christmas shine a light not only on our world’s greatest hope but also on our world’s greatest need, the PC (USA) provides this timely opportunity for congregations to support causes specifically designed to bring Good News of Great Joy to the poor in circumstance or spirit. Alongside the message of promise and fulfillment in Luke’s Gospel, we hear the clear call to God’s people to respond in faith as Christ calls us: “From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be required; and from the one to whom much has been entrusted, even more will be demanded” (Luke 12:48).

Fifty percent of the receipts from the Christmas Joy Offering are distributed to the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions, which provides support to both active and retired church workers and their spouses and families. The other 50 percent supports scholarships at the Presbyterian-related racial ethnic school and colleges: Barber-Scotia College, Concord, NC; Cook Native American Ministries, Tempe, AZ; Knoxville College, Knoxville, TN; Menaul School, Albuquerque, NM; Presbyterian Pan American School, Kingsville, TX; and Stillman College, Tuscaloosa, AL. If you would like to know about these programs, visit the posters and fact sheets posted around the building, and read the inserts in your Sunday bulletins throughout Advent.

In 2010, our denomination distributed over 3.5 million dollars for these programs combined. This can only happen through the generosity of congregants like you, who so generously share their resources again and again. Last year Rose City Park Presbyterian gave \$3,792 to the Christmas Joy offering. Beginning November 27th, envelopes for the offering can be found in the pews or in the December/January issue of *The Broadcaster*. We will receive the offering on Sunday, December 18th during worship.

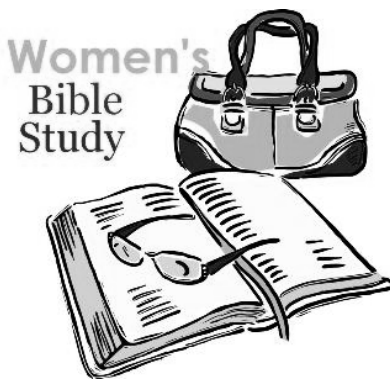

ADULT EDUCATION

Our 2011-2012 Adult Education series is off to a great start, thanks to our October presenters. Our remaining sessions in 2011 will help us to prepare for the holiday season and will allow us to get to know some of our church staff better.

FUND FOR OUTREACH AND BENEVOLENCE

A long time ago in a galaxy far, far away, the Rose City Park Presbyterian Church Session decided to designate a amount equal to 10% of monies spent on sanctuary remodel for Outreach and Benevolence. Session delegated responsibility for research to the Outreach Committee. “The project was to be used for real renewal—of us as a community of faith through new and innovative ways which call for cultural-change-in-essence, a change in us as individuals and as a community of faith.” This process was intended to be deliberate and prayerful, not to write a quick check and be done.

A nine-member sub-committee was formed and in late Spring made a proposal to allocate a portion of funds to assist church members who are struggling economically. Session determined that this did not meet the original intent of the project, but it did raise the consciousness level to this need, and they moved to establish the Pringle Assistance Fund to address this need. Confidential grants from this new fund, administered by the pastors and one deacon, provide assistance to participants in the life of RCPPC. Speak to David or Donavan if you or someone you know requires assistance.

This month the committee approved spending of \$500.00 per month of this academic year to participate in the food backpack program at Marysville Elementary School at Rose City Park, located off NE 57th Avenue. 87% of students at Marysville are Title 1, which means they receive free or reduced prices on lunches. From national news, we learned that one in four children go hungry, especially during the weekends. The food backpack program involves providing eligible students with packs filled with nutritious food on Friday, returned on Monday to be re-filled on subsequent Fridays. The committee envisions food drives and food, clothing, toys and supply drives during Christmas for “adopted school families” as part of our church’s “hands-on” commitment to this project.

Next month the committee will investigate how to support Habit for Humanity in our community. We plan to shorten considerably the decision-making process by meeting twice a month beginning in November. We have some other great ideas to explore as well. Thank you for your patience and understanding!


